A PEEK AT THE PAST: FRANK OLIVER

If you don't like a certain action, why not tell lies and encourage protest? Frank Oliver's actions as the editor of the Edmonton Bulletin did just that. Oliver was determined to get the reserve land that had been given to the Papaschase band via Treaty Six. He felt that the land, on the southern edge of Edmonton, was better suited to settlers rather than to those of Indigenous heritage.

When he was a young man, Frank Oliver, whose real name was Francis Bowsfield, took his mother's maiden name. Given his position at the Edmonton Bulletin, he was able to incite all kinds of fear and dislike amongst the settlers and made sure it was aimed at indigenous people.


The Oliver area in Edmonton was named for him, but there has been a great push for change. The area has recently been renamed to Wîhkwêntôwin, pronounced We-Kwen-To-Win. It means "circle of friends" in Cree. Regardless, he was involved in much of Edmonton's early history and should not be forgotten.

I especially liked chapter 11 titled SERVICE - Plant Trees Under Whose Shade You Do Not Plan To Sit, beginning on page 254. Here are several enlightened points from the book:

- The highest purpose is to live in service.
- Selflessness heals the self.
- When we live in service, material attachments can diminish.
- We seek to leave a place cleaner than we found it, people happier than we found them, the world better than we found it.
- Serve with intention.
- Serve with your dharma.
- Service connects us.
- Service amplifies gratitude.
- Service increases compassion.
- Service builds self-esteem.
- Service can fix a bad day.
- Service is the direct path to a meaningful life.

The author writes, "The Bhagavad Gita sees the whole world as a kind of school, an education system structured to make us realize one truth: We are compelled to serve, and only in service can we be happy. True service doesn't expect or even want anything in return. When I do something to serve you and you're happy, I'm happy."

I thought of my own journey of service. One of my favorite jobs was being a waitress! I loved serving customers, seeing them smile and enjoy their dining experience. LAURI'S HEALTHY HOMEMADE SALAD DRESSING

Last year I wrote a cookbook, *My Gentle Kitchen* - a collection of original recipes, all oil-free, lowfat, gluten-free, and vegan. Here is one of my favorites!



DRESSING LIKE CAESAR

(Tastes similar to classic Caesar salad dressing; makes about 1 cup)

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup water
- 2/3 cup hemp seeds
- 3 large garlic cloves (or to taste)
- 2 Tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 2 Tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1 Tablespoon apple cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard powder
- 1/8 teaspoon turmeric powder
- 2 teaspoons dulse flakes (or kelp powder)

1 teaspoon kala namak (also called 'black salt', for egglike flavor)

1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Directions:

Put all ingredients in a blender, mix until thick and creamy. Serve tossed with romaine lettuce and your choice of croutons and vegan bacon bits (optional).

Storage:

Store leftover dressing in fridge for up to 5 days. Enjoy!
