People can breastfeed anywhere in the building, should you want more privacy there is designated nursing space in the Millson room. Baby changing tables are installed in all washrooms. If you wish to use it, a children's activity centre is set up in the Chapel. There are activity books available. Please ask an usher.



Scriptures:

Garnet Thomas

James 3:1-12 • Who should be teachers of God's word? Not many of you should become teachers, my siblings, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits. How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our

members as a world of inquiry; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. For every species of beast and bird, or reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue - a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Creator, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth came blessing and cursing. My siblings, this ought not to be so. Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my siblings, yield olives, or a grapevine fig? No more can salt water yield fresh.

Mark 9:30-37 • Whoever welcomes a child, welcomes me.

They went on from there and passed through Galilee. Jesus did not want anyone to know it; for he was teaching his disciples, saying to them, 'The Son of God is to be betrayed into human hands, and they will kill him, and three days after being killed, he will rise again." But they did not understand what he was saying and were afraid to ask him. Then they came to Capernaum; and when he was in the house he asked them, "What were you arguing about on the way?" But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest. Jesus sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me."

GREEN BITES

Autumn is almost upon us, and as John Keats wrote many years ago, it is "The season of mists and mellow fruitfulness, close bosom friend of the maturing sun." Until recently, gardeners would be preparing to rake leaves and plant debris, trimming their perennials and hedges, then bagging everything before sending the bags to be part of Edmonton's waste management system. However, recent research has shown that many insects have laid their eggs on plants and tree leaves, and the eggs don't reach maturity until the following spring. The eggs themselves will be eaten by birds, as they are a fine source of protein for the development of bird eggs. Current thinking suggests that the decline of bird populations is partly a result of the lack of food to support the development of their eggs. We can all participate in this cycle of nature! Rather than bagging plant debris, this year why not spread it under the trees and shrubs in your yard? And please wait until late May each year to tidy your gardens. Why? Because the eggs laid by insects the year before are emerging at that time. - The Environmental Stewardship Group

Worship Notes

"Draw Us in the Spirit's Tether" a Communion anthem, was composed by Harold Friedell (1905-1958) in 1957. Friedell taught at the Julliard School and at Union Seminary in New York City. The anthem text references the famous passage in Matthew's gospel: "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." The words were written by Percy Dearmer who was an influential priest and hymn writer in the early twentieth century. Together with composer Ralph Vaughan Williams, Dearmer edited the English Hymnal, and the Oxford Book of Carols. "Draw Us in the Spirit's Tether" is set as a three-verse hymn in Voices United 479. Today's Prelude and Postlude are grand settings of familiar English hymn tunes. The Prelude is based upon the "old" melody written for the text "All Things Bright and Beautiful". Although "Royal Oak" is the tune commonly associated with the text nowadays, William Henry Monk's "All Things Bright and Beautiful" still appears in 50 hymnals and deserves to be heard from time to time. The Postlude sets Basil harwood's "Thornbury" (1898). This remains a strong and popular melody associated with hymn texts such as: "Bless Now, O God, the Journey", "To Abraham and Sarah", and "Your Hand, O God Has Guided".
